Stannary Brewery Company – Nr Tavistock

Garry White (from our Launceston office) & Chris John took over the running of the brewery in late 2017 and they now boast a range of some 20 plus beers, brewed seasonally throughout the year.

Using the freshest and best quality ingredients Stannary brew all manner of beers from Pales to Porters and IPA's to Saisons, if it's out there to brew they'll give it a go! All Stannary beers are unfiltered, unfined and serve with a natural haze, by allowing the beers to clear naturally rather than using additives like isinglass (the swim bladders of fish) Stannary beers boast bigger flavour than traditional beers and are also suitable for vegans.

The brewery is situated only a 10 minute stroll from the town centre of the picturesque market town of Tavistock on the edge of Dartmoor. The brewery taproom bar is open every Friday from 5:30pm, the bar has 10 taps serving a range of Stannary beers that changes week on week plus a number of guest beers from around the UK and the World. If beer is not your thing fear not as Stannary also stock a range of locally sourced ciders, wines & spirits and soft drinks, including ciders from Bumblebee Cider, 2 wines from the award winning Sharpham Vineyard in Totnes, Barbican Botanics small batch craft gin from Plymouth and a selection of soft drinks and tonics from Luscombe's in Buckfastleigh.

As well as the weekly taproom openings, on the last Saturday in each month Stannary hold their Beer & BBQ Bash at the brewery.

Sounds like a lot of fun!
